Ms. Higgins told the story of sewing a loose button back on to Abe Lincoln's pants before there were stored away. Every item received is carefully

cataloged and given an accession number. Then, they put the donation into storage and wait for an exhibit to be designed that it can be part of within the museum. Our teacher told us that some of the artifacts that were really old had been stored in a special way including the blood-soaked gloves found in Lincoln's pants.

Then it was our turn to donate things we had brought to the museum. Some of the things donated were Obama buttons from the DNC in Denver, pins, a yellow backpack that Mrs. Pearson wore from the YourHub/NextGen project, and a blue beanie from the

2009 DC Inauguration.


